Our clients enjoyed an abundant Christmas at the pantry thanks to the generosity of the Sodality Club at Bishop Manogue Catholic High School, Nevada Woodchucks, Reno Elks Lodge #597, Sierra Meat & Seafood, Western Nevada Supply, White's Creek Dental and loyal community donors Brett and Morgan Bargenquast, MJ Rader, Mary Robertson, and Terry Vaca.

New Mount Rose Ministries is Hard at Work

We are very proud to tell you about a new food outreach effort began by one of our most dedicated volunteers, **Kerry McKinney**. Kerry has been volunteering at Saint Francis of Assisi Food Pantry for several years now, managing the canned goods area among other things.

In her "spare time", Kerry has begun Mount Rose Ministries, a volunteer organization that distributes food to the needy at the south end of Reno. Many of those in need are low-income seniors who live in subsidized and/or senior housing, who struggle to get to pantries that are located in central and downtown Reno. This new ministry will celebrate its first anniversary in March. Way to go, Kerry!!

New Ride United Last Mile Delivery Program

We are proud to be one of the first few food pantries in Northern Nevada to participate in the new **Ride United Last Mile Delivery** program sponsored by United Way and DoorDash. This is a new program to address food insecurity needs in various communities including Reno/Sparks.

The motivation for this new program is explained on the UnitedWay.org website: "Across the United States, a lack of reliable, safe, convenient transportation hinders hundreds of thousands of peoples' abilities to get to good jobs, access healthcare, seek healthy food, apply for public benefits and more."

"Ride United addresses these unmet transportation needs for individuals and families in communities across the country. With COVID-19 presenting new barriers to food access, especially for older adults and individuals with higher vulnerability, Ride United now offers deliveries of food and household goods."

Our first deliveries to homebound clients began the week of Feb. 8. We are excited about this new outreach to those in our community who struggle to get to the pantry due to not having a car and lacking access or funds to bus or taxi rides. Food from the pantry will be delivered to these clients at no cost to them, thanks to this new innovative partnership with DoorDash and United Way.

New Pantry Shopping Carts Make Their Debut

We use shopping carts at the pantry to streamline the process as clients move through pantry rooms. The special small size carts are stationed in the canned goods/non-perishable food room where our clients make their choices, then travel with their cart to the next room to get their bread, cereal, snacks and pet food. Clients then roll their carts to the perishable food room at the back of the pantry where they obtain fresh fruit, vegetables, dairy, eggs, and meat or poultry. Clients then use the carts to bring their pantry items to their cars.

Inflation is Taking Its Toll

The fastest and most significant inflation in the last 40 years is having a negative effect on food prices, not only at supermarkets but also for our country's food banks, who are seeing reduced donations at the same time they are having to pay higher prices to make up for the drop in donations. The additional food costs are compounded by higher gas prices and the global struggle with supply chain disruptions.

Inflation hits everyone, but has a greater impact on poor and middle-class families who typically spend a bigger portion of their income on food and other necessities. As noted in a report by CBS News on January 31, 2022, "Rapid price hikes in low-cost goods sold by Amazon, Wal-Mart and Dollar General are disproportionately hurting lower-income Americans."

Our local food bank, the Food Bank of Northern Nevada, is seeing few trucks arriving with perishable foods, such as fresh fruits, vegetables and meat. Even the normally plentiful and reliable supply of basic commodities donated to food banks by the US Dept. of Agriculture through its The Emergency Food n Assistance Program (TEFAP) has been diminished. All of these factors lead to higher costs for food banks, as they purchase food to make up for shortfalls in donations. They pass along these costs to their partner food pantries, including Saint Francis of Assisi Food Pantry, which at the same time is seeing an uptick in the number of clients needing assistance.




In order to keep our shelves stocked with sufficient food for increasing number of clients, we purchase food at Costco Wholesale, Grocery Outlet, and other local sources when less food is available from the Food Bank of Northern Nevada. We greatly appreciate and rely on donations from our local supporters to keep the pantry doors open and our shelves stocked with the variety of food necessary for clients, many of whom are families with children or seniors who struggle with chronic health and nutrition issues.
