The original Sharing Hope party was created for Sister Carmen Baca, who has run a food pantry sponsored by Our Lady of the Snows Catholic Church in Reno for many decades. Our pantry founder, Cindy Becher, organized this fundraiser for several years. Sister Carmen is retiring in July after more than 40 years of steadfast dedicated service to our community and she has given us her blessing to use the name Sharing Hope for our annual fundraising event.

Hope Rolls Home in Shopping Carts

The pantry has recently received two grants, one from Dermody Properties Foundation and one from the Food Bank of Northern Nevada, which allowed us to purchase a supply of sturdy folding shopping carts which we give to our disabled clients who need assistance bringing their food home from the pantry. Clients are thrilled to have an easy way to transport a cart full of fresh, nutritious food to their homes and we are delighted we can make their lives a little easier.

When new carts are received, employees Kye and Jose at Complete Millworks Services, Inc. assemble them and attach our pantry logo to the front of each cart. The carts are then ready to distribute to pantry clients, and soon hope rolls out the pantry door and into our community!

Reno's Housing Woes on BBC Website

One of our volunteers passed along an in-depth report posted by the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) on the current economic situation in the US. Surprisingly, it focused on the housing crisis currently happening in Reno.

Reporters from the BBC wrote a lengthy article published on the BBC News website on February 20 this year that included interviews with state officials and a private sector financial analyst in Las Vegas, along with leaders and clients of the Food Bank of Northern Nevada and St. Vincent's Food Pantry in Reno. A few excerpts from the article follow:

"Unemployment is low, but unfortunately unemployment is not a great indicator of how many people are hungry," says Jocelyn Lantrip, from the Food Bank of Northern Nevada, which supplies charities including St. Vincent's Food Pantry. And often, those going hungry - or temporarily homeless - are people who already have jobs.

Elliott Parker, chair of economics at the University of Nevada, Reno, argues that "recovery is in the eye of the beholder". The latest data from the Census Bureau suggests that median household income is still just below 2008 levels, he adds. "We are finally at the end of a very long recovery - but wages have risen nowhere near as fast as housing and rental prices."

Nevada has the nation's worst shortage of affordable housing for low-income families, according to an advocacy group, only 19 homes for every 100 low-income renter households. There are various reasons for the house prices - including stalled construction from the 2008 financial crisis that has been slow to pick up.

And Reno residents complain about the "Tesla effect" - as tech workers and retirees from the more expensive neighbouring state of California cross the border into Nevada, they push up rental prices for locals.

"Fifty percent of people in Nevada rent, and half of them are rent burdened - meaning they spend more than 30% of their income on housing," says state Senator Julia Ratti, whose district covers the Reno-Sparks area.

New Coronavirus Procedures at the Pantry

Our innovative pantry President Cindy Becher has instituted new procedures at the pantry to safely distribute food to our clients in this difficult time when we are all being urged to avoid crowds to reduce the impact of the coronavirus in our area.

Cindy has created a new paper *Pantry Grocery List* that will be given to clients who arrive at the pantry. They will mark the food items they are seeking; volunteers inside the pantry will do their shopping for them while they wait in their car or wait outside if they have arrived on food, by bus or bicycle. Volunteers will select their items from our shelves and bag everything, then staple their list to their bags and hand the bags to our clients.

Says Cindy, "I'm not planning on closing the pantry any time soon and I really think we can help our clients with obtaining the right foods that they need to help their families and still be giving them choices. Let's all work together and help our 'Brothers and Sisters' in our Community!!"

Our courageous and dedicated volunteers are making this new method work for as long as we are under the coronavirus threat. On March 17, Nevada Governor Sisolak ordered "non-essential" businesses in the state to close, but he exempted essential businesses including "food, shelter or social services for disadvantaged populations."



Happy 4th Birthday to Us!

We are happy to celebrate birthday number 4 of the Saint Francis of Assisi Food Pantry in April!

The pantry first opened its doors on April 4, 2016 and served 205 families in that first month. Today the pantry serves approximately **1,000** families per month! From March 1, 2019 through February 29, 2020, our clients made nearly 12,000 visits to the pantry for food assistance, and the numbers continue to rise.

Green Solutions Recycling Says Good Bye

We were sorry to learn that Green Solutions Recycling can no longer offer us free pick-up of our discarded cardboard because they are withdrawing from the Northern Nevada market. They set up their recycling dumpster in our back parking lot in January, 2018 and we have been extremely grateful to them for emptying the dumpster weekly. The pantry generates a LOT of cardboard from all the boxes we receive containing produce, eggs, and other food.

We have now signed an agreement with Waste Management to pick up our recycling, but at a significant monthly cost to the pantry. We thank Green Solutions Recycle for their generosity and community spirit the past 2 years. They are champs & we hope to see them back someday!
